As lawmakers and regulators consider new legislation and regulatory actions, NDA urges caution against one-size-fits-all approaches that can produce unintended consequences and restrict economic opportunity. Implementing reasonable and balanced laws and regulations allows small businesses to reinvest in capital improvements, expand their workforce, and contribute to sustained economic growth.

NDA supports common sense regulations that protect workers and the environment. Demolition contractors are committed to maintaining safe job sites and complying with all federal rules and regulations pertaining to the demolition industry. Sensible and evidence-based regulations are essential to supporting a strong workforce and a resilient economy.

Policymakers should also prioritize reforms to workforce development programs to address persistent labor shortages and skills gaps affecting industries like demolition. Strengthening workforce development and professional training programs will create sustainable career pathways and equip individuals with the skills needed to succeed in high-demand fields.

1. WORKPLACE SAFETY & HEALTH

The National Demolition Association (NDA) is committed to the safety and protection of workers at all times and takes that responsibility seriously. NDA member companies have an excellent record of providing a safe environment and work with government officials regularly to mitigate hazards. Laws and regulations relating to demolition safety are necessary but should remain practical and not impose undue burdens on industry practitioners. NDA believes federal agencies, such as the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), have a responsibility to balance regulations that provide for a safe and healthy work environment while considering effects on small businesses. Federal agencies should focus on achieving a more efficient workforce and minimal workplace injuries by promoting approaches to safety and health through partnerships with employers who take safety programs seriously, while making sure enforcement violations are tailored to non-compliant companies. Federal agencies must fully consider the costs and benefits of proposed regulations prior to proposal to ensure that federal and private resources are utilized effectively to improve safety.

- NDA supports reasonable efforts by the government to address harmful exposure levels to substances, such as respirable crystalline silica, and believes the government should consider the economic effects of the OSHA silica rule and others, proposed and not proposed, on the demolition industry as it pursues protections.
- NDA urges federal agencies to consider the specific challenges faced by the demolition industry and to work collaboratively to ensure that demolition contractors are not unfairly burdened.
- NDA supports efforts to address the health of workers, including from exposure to harmful levels of toxins. Government action must be grounded in sound science, sustainable, and a proven benefit to the public.



WORKPLACE SAFETY & HEALTH (CONTINUED)

- NDA is committed to working with federal agencies to provide industry expertise to ensure rules and standards are workable and effective. To this end, NDA believes any major federal regulations impacting the private sector should receive a formal notice-and-comment period before taking effect.
- NDA supports an employer's right to screen employees for substances that pose a risk to the worksite and other employees. Drug testing greatly improves workplace safety, a priority for the demolition industry, and reduces worker's compensation costs.
- NDA opposes overly burdensome recordkeeping requirements that unduly burden small businesses. Government regulations should balance effective safeguards with feasibility and fairness to the regulated community.



2. WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

NDA urges Congress and the Administration to prioritize policies that encourage a robust and skilled workforce. Labor shortages have a detrimental impact on the demolition industry and U.S. economy as a whole. In recent years, NDA member companies have faced unprecedented obstacles in recruiting and retaining qualified employees to work in the demolition industry. The ongoing struggle to maintain a robust and qualified workforce pipeline presents difficult economic challenges for contractors, both now and in the future. NDA supports policies to address the shortage of qualified candidates for high-skilled jobs and increase the pool of qualified candidates for technical jobs on demolition sites.

- NDA supports policies to improve and expand apprenticeship opportunities, vocational training, and other work-based learning initiatives to address the shortage of skilled labor in the private sector.
- NDA supports the timely reauthorization of federal workforce development laws to ensure they continue to meet the needs of employers and workers.
- NDA supports policies to address the shortage of qualified candidates for high-skilled jobs by improving and promoting STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) education in secondary and post-secondary education settings.
- NDA supports Pell Grants and efforts to improve the program to better align educational opportunities with workforce needs.
- NDA supports the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education program and other policies to boost technical training in secondary and postsecondary education settings.
- NDA supports the use of federal block grants to states for workforce development initiatives.
- NDA supports policies that encourage the training and hiring of military veterans for jobs in the demolition industry.



WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT (CONTINUED)

- NDA supports temporary guest worker programs to recruit legal, foreign-born individuals when there is a shortage of domestic workers to fill available positions.
- NDA opposes government policies that discourage individuals from joining the labor force and negatively impact employee retention.



3. INFRASTRUCTURE

Infrastructure development is essential for sustaining economic growth and improving the quality of life and safety of all Americans. Infrastructure investment helps create jobs, stimulate innovation, and ensure the United States has a resilient and robust supply chain. Congress should support legislation to strengthen key infrastructure programs such as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, Highway Trust Fund, USACE Military Construction and Civil Works programs, and EPA Brownfields and Superfund programs. In addition, policymakers should pursue reforms to the federal permitting process to eliminate unnecessary red tape and expedite the delivery of infrastructure projects to local communities. Federal action on these critical policies will help rebuild America and provide the demolition industry with the certainty needed to maintain and expand its workforce.

- NDA supports the reauthorization of infrastructure programs from the 2021 Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. Congress should continue to provide robust funding for these programs and consider public feedback to improve upon the previous law.
- NDA supports investments in infrastructure projects, specifically facility rehabilitation, construction and demolition in schools, hospitals, water/wastewater, electricity, airports and inland waterways, ports, and other public facilities.
- NDA supports expedited environmental reviews by giving the Army Corps of Engineers primary authority to make jurisdictional determinations under the Clean Water Act (CWA) and removing the Environmental Protection Agency's authority to veto a CWA Section 404 permit.
- NDA supports policies to streamline the federal permitting process for infrastructure projects, including the use of concurrent reviews and reasonable time limits for agency decisions. NDA encourages similar permitting reforms at the state and local levels.



INFRASTRUCTURE (CONTINUED)

- NDA supports funding for the Airport Improvement Program, which funds improvements at airports across the nation and supports more than 100,000 jobs annually.
- NDA supports critical financing tools to encourage infrastructure development such as Private Activity Bonds.
- NDA supports market-oriented solutions to address supply chain disruptions and strengthen the movement of goods in the United States.



4. LABOR & HUMAN RESOURCES

NDA member companies firmly believe that employees and employers are the best parties to determine issues ranging from wages and working conditions, through either individual or collective bargaining, within the boundaries of the law. The employer is responsible for observing the welfare of the employee and there must be adequate compensation for work performed. On the same note, NDA believes that the employee has an obligation to perform work in a satisfactory manner. Over time, government policies have steadily increased the administrative costs on employers, and federal agencies must consider this reality when proposing additional regulations.

- NDA supports adoption of the economic reality test to distinguish between employees and independent contractors under the Fair Labor Standards Act.
- NDA opposes regulatory changes to the federal overtime rule that would cause demolition industry workers to be erroneously reclassified as non-exempt employees under the duties test, even when they clearly qualify as exempt employees.
- NDA opposes any increase to the overtime pay eligibility threshold that ignores regional and industry variations in wages and cost of living, decreases workplace flexibility, or makes it more difficult to develop future managerial talent. Further, NDA opposes automatic updates to the minimum salary threshold in any future overtime rule.
- NDA opposes the dramatic expansion of the traditional test for joint employer status in which a company must exercise “direct and immediate control” over an employment relationship.
- NDA opposes regulations by federal agencies to ban non-compete agreements.
- NDA opposes regulatory efforts to reduce the amount of time employers have to communicate with their employees between the time they learn that a union is trying to organize the workforce and the election.



LABOR & HUMAN RESOURCES (CONTINUED)

- NDA supports legislation guaranteeing an employer's ability to participate in a fair union election and ensuring employees can make fully informed decisions about joining a union.
- NDA believes that secret ballot elections should be preserved and are the fairest way to guarantee the rights of employees to freely choose whether to be represented by a union.
- NDA opposes efforts to institute mandatory binding arbitration in union representation disputes and other efforts that would restrict employers' ability to freely communicate with their employees regarding union representation.
- NDA opposes federal regulations requiring private employers to post notice in the workplace advising employees of their right to join a union.
- NDA supports long-held disclosure standards concerning communications with outside consultants regarding labor union activities.
- NDA opposes the expansion of the Family Medical Leave Act (FMLA) and other government mandates that eliminate employers' ability to negotiate flexible leave policies with their employees. A fair and considerate leave policy should be between employers and their employees.
- NDA supports legislation that ensures employers are protected from frivolous lawsuits when making good-faith efforts to follow applicable public health guidelines and safe workplace regulations during national health emergencies.
- The federal government should thoroughly analyze and take into consideration comments from regulated stakeholders before implementing changes to the federal E-Verify system.

5. TAX POLICY

A fair and workable tax code is essential to the success of American business. Providing businesses with a predictable planning outlook as it pertains to tax incentives is one of the most effective methods for strengthening American economic competitiveness and creating jobs. Most demolition contractors conduct business in such a way that their income is taxed at the individual level, commonly referred to as pass-through entities. These small and medium-sized employers would be significantly affected by higher marginal tax rates, taxes and fees on assets, and other confiscatory proposals. Over fifty percent of the private sector workforce is employed by pass-through entities and higher taxes greatly impact the ability of small businesses to retain these employees. NDA supports tax policy that enables the demolition industry to compete and provide quality jobs across America.

- NDA supports a simplified tax code that does not place an unnecessary burden on job-creating companies.
- NDA opposes increases to personal income tax rates that are also tax hikes on the many small businesses that are structured as pass-through entities (S corporations, partnerships, and sole proprietorships).
- NDA supports the Section 199A qualified business income deduction for pass-through businesses.
- NDA supports tax policy that continues to provide permanent and enhanced Section 179 expensing and 100% bonus depreciation, which incentivizes capital investments such as machinery and equipment purchases.
- NDA supports federal tax policy that lowers corporate income tax rates and makes U.S. businesses more globally competitive.
- NDA opposes increases to the capital gains tax rate to help small businesses create jobs, contribute to economic growth, and invest in their future.

TAX POLICY (CONTINUED)

- NDA opposes any attempts to implement a mandatory vehicle miles-traveled tax (VMT) on American drivers.
- NDA supports the permanent repeal of the estate tax.
- NDA supports the “step-up in basis” tax provision which protects family-owned businesses from the imposition of capital gains taxes at death when passing down their business to the next generation.
- NDA supports legislative efforts to provide employers with tax incentives, access to low-interest loans, and other financial relief measures during national emergencies.



6. ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP

NDA is committed to practices that protect the environment and our member companies have a reputable track record of commendable environmental stewardship. However, NDA remains concerned that certain regulations, while well-intentioned, will place a significant administrative burden on demolition contractors. In recent years, federal agencies have enacted costly and burdensome regulations with little consideration for the impact they would have on American businesses and their workers. NDA is committed to working with the federal government to ensure environmental regulations are effective and take into consideration the unique complexities of the demolition industry.

- NDA supports balanced, scientifically based environmental stewardship policies with measurable and attainable goals for American companies.
- NDA believes new environmental regulations must reflect sound science and take into account any impacts on regulated stakeholders.
- NDA supports the continued implementation of laws reforming the Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA) and will assist federal agencies with their role as necessary.
- NDA supports the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) efforts and other initiatives to encourage water conservation and use-efficiency in new and existing structures as long as those programs are voluntary, cost-effective, affordable, and consider consumer preferences.
- NDA supports funding for the EPA's Brownfields and Superfund grant programs and is committed to working with the federal government to facilitate the appropriate handling of hazardous areas.
- NDA member companies are committed to protecting the environment by complying with existing EPA standards on demolition sites, including National Emissions Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants (NESHAP) regulations. NDA opposes any attempts by the EPA to alter interpretations of well-established NESHAP regulations and other environmental standards without initiating a formal notice-and-comment rulemaking process.



ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP (CONTINUED)

- NDA supports sensible government policies regarding end-of-life management that take into account the impact on demolition contractors.
- NDA believes any changes to the Clean Water Act should reasonably balance environmental objectives with regulatory certainty and protection of property rights for private stakeholders and landowners.



7. TRADE

NDA member companies are affected by several aspects of federal trade policies, especially tariffs. NDA urges the Administration to cautiously weigh the costs and benefits of trade remedy actions against other countries, including Canada, Mexico, China, and European Union member countries. NDA remains concerned about trade policies that impose significant economic costs on the demolition industry and disrupt supply chains for small businesses. NDA members utilize equipment procured both domestically and abroad, and it is imperative that a competitive market for these products not be ruptured by government policies. Lastly, the federal government should pursue a trade agenda that provides stability, certainty, and predictability for American businesses.

- NDA supports trade policies that open markets and level the playing field globally for American companies.
- NDA supports the elimination of border barriers that hinder market access, including tariffs and non-tariff barriers, to allow for the improvement of U.S. competitiveness in North America and globally.
- NDA advocates for a balanced approach to trade policy that minimizes unintended consequences on small businesses and the demolition industry.
- NDA opposes the inclusion of construction machinery, equipment, and related supplies on tariff lists.
- NDA supports trade agreements that facilitate robust commercial relationships with foreign countries that have a history of strong ties and cooperation with the United States.
- NDA supports modifications to existing trade agreements that alleviate or eliminate provisions that are unfair or disadvantageous to U.S. interests, ensuring that any modifications consider the impact on the demolition industry.



8. HEALTHCARE

The availability of quality healthcare benefits is a priority for NDA and its member companies. NDA supports common-sense proposals that would address the increasing costs of health insurance, particularly for employer-sponsored arrangements and the rising number of uninsured Americans. Unfortunately, the provisions contained in the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA) did little to provide relief to demolition contractors. NDA urges Congress and the Administration to provide more choices to employers and workers and allow private insurers to compete in the market.

- NDA supports reforms to the healthcare system, including the ACA, which will improve employers' ability to provide quality and affordable health coverage to employees and their families.
- NDA remains concerned with tax changes brought forward by healthcare reform, namely the 3.8% surtax included in the ACA and any attempts to apply this tax to active business income.
- NDA opposes any government efforts to restrict the availability of self-insured group health plans, including stop-loss insurance.



9. DISASTER RESPONSE

NDA is firmly committed to assisting communities in the wake of devastating man-made and natural disasters and recovering in the most effective and efficient manner possible. Demolition contractors are uniquely qualified and trained to respond to these disasters and treat that responsibility with the utmost care for the citizens and environment. NDA supports lowering government barriers and cutting red tape to expedite the delivery of disaster relief resources to impacted communities.

- NDA supports federal disaster recovery assistance that returns displaced residents to their homes and encourages the timely recovery and rebuilding of disaster-impacted areas.
- To adequately protect workers from hazards during disaster response operations, demolition contractors take critical steps to comply with several federal safety standards, including OSHA's Hazardous Waste Operations and Emergency Response (HAZWOPER) rule. Given that demolition workers are already protected by these existing regulations, NDA opposes attempts by federal agencies to create duplicative, contradictory, and unnecessary standards for employers engaged in disaster recovery and clean-up operations.
- NDA supports voluntary public-private programs within the federal government to address the following issues related to disaster response and cleanup: lack of protection from liability, insufficient compensation for labor and equipment, and the lack of qualitative standards for determining awarded contracts.
- NDA is committed to working with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the System for Award Management (SAM) to ensure NDA members are the go-to entities in the wake of natural disasters.



DISASTER RESPONSE (CONTINUED)

- NDA supports the adoption of regulatory and legislative measures, such as temporary waivers and/or permit streamlining, and expanding their ability to address the demand for multiple victims' assistance programs such as financial assistance for repair and replacement of housing, rental assistance and other emergency housing funds for the rebuilding of businesses.
- NDA supports a robust federal response to unforeseen pandemics that assists employers and workers with financial flexibility and economic stimulation.



10. PROCUREMENT TRANSPARENCY & FAIRNESS

NDA is firmly opposed to efforts from state and local governments to forgo a fair and transparent procurement process by establishing in-house demolition programs utilizing federal funds. NDA supports adoption of regulatory and legislative measures which would require all entities that receive federal funding for demolition projects, including state and local governments, to solicit competitive bids from private contractors.



11. ELECTRIC VEHICLES

The use of light and heavy-duty electric vehicles (EV) has increased in the United States over the past several years and has sparked discussion among lawmakers over EV policies at all levels of government. As EV technology has become more advanced with time, the federal government and certain states have implemented incentives and other policies to encourage the public adoption of EVs, such as tax credits, rebates, and grants for consumers and businesses. While NDA is cognizant of the evolving role EVs play in the marketplace, NDA believes the transition to EVs on the national level should be voluntary and primarily driven by market forces. NDA continues to monitor federal policies surrounding EVs and will carefully consider their impact on the demolition industry.
